PROS TIP

When playing from bunkers it is important to open the club face, so the club has a chance to slide through the sand and not dig in. If the club face is open it has a sliding effect. You can then take a fair bit of sand and get the ball out of the bunker.

It is also vitally important to trust your swing and have a decent follow through. Too often I see many players quitting or stopping on the shot. Remember it's the force of the follow through (providing you take the right amount of sand) that throws the ball out of the bunker. If your club face is square the leading edge has a chance to dig into the sand and you will leave your ball in the bunker. Try this in practice before you take this out on course, and you will improve your bunker shots.

COURSE NEWSLETTER

Plenty of rain has been the name of the game over the past month with just under 400mm of rain since late February. Between the heavy storms and long periods of rain later in the month, we have had the wettest conditions on the course for many years. As I am sure the ladies can attest to, storms late in the week, (mid-morning Thursdays) have made weekend preparations very difficult.

The extra work that comes with the rain really stretches our staff and equipment, but luckily the volunteers are always there to step up to help in any way they can. It's not all bad news with the rain. Good steady rain gets deep into the soil which has been much needed after such a long dry spell. It's been a very long time since we have had decent rain, plenty of storms that simply run off the surface, but steady rain will set us up nicely for winter.

It will take us a few weeks to get back on top of the mowing and getting the bunkers back to good shape, but the long-term benefits will outweigh the initial issues. We have used this opportunity to aerate the fairways, usually they are too hard for our machine to get to any decent depth, but after a few days of decent rain we got to the full depth which helped to dry them out but also helped more moisture to get deeper into the ground.

It is important leading into winter to keep carts on paths where available, the better this can be done the less wear we will have, allowing a better course through winter.

Another issue that has become more of a problem since we removed rakes is people climbing the faces of bunkers. I'm not talking about the odd footprint. It's the people that climb the left-hand side of the 3rd green, left-hand side of the 8th green, left-hand side of the 9th green etc. In many cases these people are sliding back or scrambling to get out.

No one likes to land in a footprint on a slope and remain there when the ball could have rolled back into the flat area of the bunker.

If everyone could refrain from doing this, and also encourage their partners not to, this will make the maintenance easier and appearance much more pleasant.


LADIES NEWS


RULE OF THE MONTH – TAKING RELIEF ON THE GOLF COURSE

DIAGRAM 16.1b: FREE RELIEF FROM ABNORMAL COURSE CONDITION IN GENERAL AREA




Free relief is allowed when the ball is in the general area and there is interference by an abnormal course condition. The nearest point of complete relief should be identified and a ball must be dropped in and come to rest in the relief area. The relief area is one club-length from the reference point, is not nearer to the hole than the reference point and must be in the general area. When taking relief, the player must take complete relief from all interference by the abnormal course condition.

DIAGRAM 16.1c: RELIEF FROM ABNORMAL COURSE CONDITION IN BUNKER



The diagram assumes a right-handed player. When there is interference from an abnormal course condition in a bunker, free relief may be taken in the bunker under Rule 16.1b or relief may be taken outside the bunker for one penalty stroke. Relief outside the bunker is based on a reference line going straight back from the hole through the spot of the original ball in the bunker. The reference point is a point on the course outside the bunker chosen by the player that is on the reference line and is farther from the hole than the original spot (with no limit on how far back on the line). The relief area is one club-length from the reference point, is not nearer to the hole than the reference point, but may be in any area of the course. In choosing this reference point, the player should indicate the point by using an object (such as a tee).

DIAGRAM 16.1d: FREE RELIEF FROM ABNORMAL COURSE CONDITION ON PUTTING GREEN



The diagram assumes the player is left-handed. When a ball is on the putting green and there is interference by an abnormal course condition, free relief may be taken by placing a ball on the spot of the nearest point of complete relief. The nearest point of complete relief must be either on the putting green or in the general area. If there is no such nearest point of complete relief, the player may still take this free relief by using the point of maximum available relief as the reference point, which must be either on the putting green or in the general area.
