
PROSHOP NEWS

Seasoned golfers know that it is important to keep the grips clean by removing stains from sunscreen, sweat, dirt, and coarse debris that have accumulated. This process will allow the grip to last longer. Often the grips will become "part" of the golf club, but grips do need to be replaced at some point.

With the change of season, it is now a good time to re-evaluate your golf club grips. New grips make the world of difference. Old grips cause you to hold onto the club too tightly. New grips allow for proper pressure, which in turn allows for proper swing mechanics.

5" to 6.5"	Undersize

Just a reminder to fill in your divots on the practice fairway just as you would on the course. Of late we are seeing a lot of unfilled divots which makes it difficult to get the area to regrow. It is vital that we try to keep this area in good shape as the only current practice area on the course.

COURSE NEWSLETTER

After 640mm of rain from late February until two weeks ago, we have now suddenly hit the cooler Autumn weather, and it has been a very welcome change. We still have a few wet areas around the course where the water will seep for quite some time, but it has finally been dry enough to get on top of the mowing that has been out of control for quite some time. The cooler weather has certainly slowed up the growth around the course, so I think our growing season has finally at least slowed down.

As we all know, Gailes is one of, if not the best draining course in south east Queensland. It means we rarely have the course closed, even for carts, but this does not mean we don't suffer from heavy, long periods of rain. Due to the age of our greens, they hold moisture much longer than is healthy. Grass does not like wet feet, especially highly maintained and heavily trafficked golf greens. When they stay wet too long, the roots simply rot away. This means it becomes very weak and susceptible to any and all stresses. We had a few areas on some of the greens simply melt out due to the plant shutting down, this coupled with some irrigation issues caused some areas on a few greens suffering damage. They are back to full health and are recovering quite well, they should be back to normal in a few weeks.

The bunkers are another part of the course that doesn't enjoy the heavy rain, but this goes for every golf course. The volunteers have made it their goal to start to investigate all of the greens with drainage issues, and so far they have been very successful in their quest. You would have noticed some pipe sticking out of some of the bunkers, this is to help them drain before we do the more serious machinery work.

RULE OF THE MONTH

2.1 Course Boundaries and Out of Bounds Golf is played on a course whose boundaries are set by the Committee. Areas not on the course are out of bounds.

2.2 Areas of the Course

There are five areas of the course.

A The General Area

The general area covers the entire course **except** for the four specific areas of the course described in <u>Rule 2.2b</u>.

It is called the "general" area because:

- It covers most of the course and is where a player's ball will most often be played until the ball reaches the putting green.
- It includes every type of ground and growing or attached objects found in that area, such as fairway, rough and trees.

B The Four Specific Areas

Certain Rules apply specifically to the four areas of the course that are not in the general area:

- The teeing area the player must use in starting the hole he or she is playing (<u>Rule 6.2</u>),
- All penalty areas (Rule 17),
- All bunkers (<u>Rule 12</u>), and
- The putting green of the hole the player is playing (<u>Rule 13</u>).

C Determining Area of Course Where Ball Lies

The area of the course where a player's ball lies affects the Rules that apply in playing the ball or taking relief.

A ball is always treated as lying in only one area of the course:

- If part of the ball is in both the general area and one of the four specific areas of the course, it is treated as lying in that specific area of the course.
- If part of the ball is in two specific areas of the course, it is treated as lying in the specific area that comes first in this order: penalty area, bunker, putting green.

2.3 Objects or Conditions That Can Interfere with Play

Certain Rules may give free relief (relief with no penalty) from interference by certain defined objects or conditions, such as:

- Loose impediments (<u>Rule 15.1</u>),
- Movable obstructions (<u>Rule 15.2</u>), and
- Abnormal course conditions, which are animal holes, ground under repair, immovable obstructions and temporary water (<u>Rule 16.1</u>).

But there is no free relief from boundary objects or integral objects that interfere with play.

2.4 No Play Zones

A no play zone is a defined part of an abnormal course condition (see <u>Rule 16.1f</u>) or a penalty area (see <u>Rule 17.1e</u>) where play is not allowed.

A player must take relief when:

- His or her ball is in a no play zone, or
- A no play zone interferes with his or her area of intended stance or area of intended swing in playing a ball outside the no play zone (see Rules <u>16.1f</u> and <u>17.1e</u>).

See Committee Procedures, <u>Section 5H(1)</u> (a Code of Conduct may tell players to stay out of a no play zone entirely).

FROM THE CAPTAIN

After what seems like a long period of heavy rain and storms which saw the course take quite a battering, we are still seeing the rains tumbling down causing disruptions to playing conditions. Whilst the rain is welcome it is becoming an issue for the health of greens as no doubt you would have noticed. For greens to remain healthy they need good drainage, and our greens are not draining well at present due to age and nutrient build up.

Credit must go to the ground staff for keeping the course playable during this time.

WELCOME BACK DON FARDON.

After a period of absence, it is great to see Don Fardon back at the club playing again. For those who don't know Don he has been an icon of Gailes Golf Club for decades through his golfing prowess and his contribution to the club. At his prime Don was one of the best amateur golfers in Australia. If you see him around say hello, Don always has some good advice on golf to pass on to anyone who asks. Welcome back Don.
